The mitigation plan is a multi-hazard, multi-jurisdictional plan covering 11 counties in South Central Kansas. This plan is updated every five years and we are due for an update. This plan is complete and approved by FEMA. This was discussed at the Commission meeting on 10/01/19, a county resolution is required to adopt this plan.

ADOPTING THE SOUTH CENTRAL (REGION G) MULTI-HAZARD MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN

WHEREAS, Reno County recognizes the threat that natural hazards pose to people and property within our community; and

WHEREAS, undertaking hazard mitigation actions will reduce the potential for harm to people and property from future hazard occurrences; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Congress passed the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 ("Disaster Mitigation Act") emphasizing the need for pre-disaster mitigation of potential hazards;

WHEREAS, the Disaster Mitigation Act made available hazard mitigation grants to state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, an adopted Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan is required as a condition of future funding for mitigation projects under multiple FEMA pre- and post-disaster mitigation grant programs; and

WHEREAS, Reno County fully participated in the FEMA-prescribed mitigation planning process to prepare this Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Division of Emergency Management and the Federal Emergency Management Agency Region VII officials have reviewed the "South-Central Kansas (Region G) Multi-Hazard, Multi-Jurisdictional Mitigation Plan," and approved it contingent upon this official adoption of the participating governing body; and

WHEREAS, Reno County desires to comply with the requirements of the Disaster Mitigation Act and to augment its emergency planning efforts by formally

adopting the South-Central Kansas (Region G) Multi-Hazard, Multi-Jurisdictional Mitigation Plan; and

WHEREAS, adoption by the governing body for Reno County demonstrates the jurisdictions' commitment to fulfilling the mitigation goals and objectives outlined in this plan, and

WHEREAS, adoption of this legitimizes the plan and authorizes responsible agencies to carry out their responsibilities under the plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Reno County adopts the "South Central (Region G) Multi-Hazard Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan" as an official plan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Reno County will submit this Adoption Resolution to the Kansas Division of Emergency Management and Federal Emergency Management Agency Region VII officials to enable the plan's final approval.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY *(Title or Description, Impact or Goal, Dollar Amount and Funding Source, and Timeframe). Please limit to four (4) sentences.*

- The following three (3) bridge rehabilitation projects will be advertised for bid October 11th, with bid letting on November 1st, 2019 and construction to begin the spring of 2020:
 - o Nickerson Blvd. Bridge 28.50 over the Diversion Canal just west of the Hutchinson City Limits;
 - o 82nd Avenue 42.93 over Blaze Fork just west of the Harvey / Reno County line;
 - o Medora Road 30.25 just North of 95th Avenue over the Little Ark River.
- The rehabilitation of these bridges will be funded from the County's Special Bridge Fund 006.
- The engineering construction estimate for these three projects is \$1,885,000.00.
- Pending three (3) bridge replacement projects:
 - o Nickerson Road Bridge 27.99 over the Ark River south of the City of Nickerson;
 - o 43rd Avenue Bridge 33.80 over the Union Pacific Railroad. We are still waiting for the Union Pacific Railroad's response of the final plan submittal and receipt of the draft "Real Estate Agreement".
- These bridge replacements to be funded with Bond Financing.
- The engineering construction estimate for these two projects is \$5,504,000.00.
- Once we have the final approval from the Union Pacific Railroad, the bond procurement process can begin and a bid letting date can be set for the 43rd Avenue and Nickerson Road bridge replacements.
- Wilson Road Bridge 25.90 at the Willowbrook Entrance is scheduled for letting in 2024.

RCCF Stats – August 1 thru September 30th 2019
